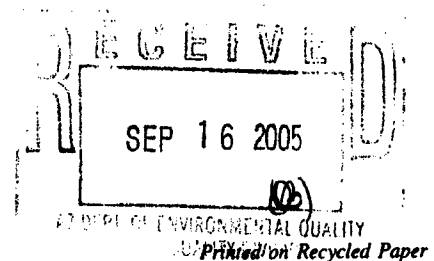

Dear Ms. Card:

As you know, on August 22, 2005, the Ninth Circuit vacated EPA's approval of the Arizona National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program. Defenders of Wildlife, et al. v. EPA, et al., No. 03-71439, 2005 WL 2001100. We are writing to confirm EPA's position that unless and until the court's mandate is issued, Arizona's authorization to issue NPDES permits and implement the program remains in effect.

Under the Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure (FRAP 40 and 41), the earliest the mandate could issue is October 14, 2005. (October 14th is seven days after expiration of the 45 day time period for filing a petition for rehearing in this case.) However, if the United States or another party to the litigation files a petition for rehearing before the Ninth Circuit, the mandate would not issue until the court takes further action. If the court refuses to rehear the case and denies the petition, the mandate would enter seven days from the court's action. If the petition for rehearing is granted, the mandate would issue only if the court's new decision on the merits affirms the panel's decision to vacate EPA's approval. If the decision on rehearing reached a different or contrary result, the mandate for that decision would supercede the mandate issued by the current panel.

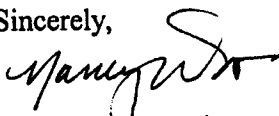
EPA, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Department of Justice (DOJ) are currently evaluating the court's decision and deciding whether to file a petition for rehearing with the Ninth Circuit. Of course, we will notify you when that decision is made. Unless and until the August 22 decision becomes effective, EPA's approval of Arizona's NPDES program continues in effect, and the State of Arizona retains authority to administer and enforce the requirements of that program. Dischargers can continue to seek authorization under individual and general permits from ADEQ pursuant to the approved program.
